

All Saints Day & Mass for the Deceased




Because the Feast of All Saints falls on Saturday, the Obligation to attend Mass is moved to the regular weekend liturgies.

# **Be Aware Of Collections - Fake Money**

Steps to Obtain a Plenary Indulgence for Souls in Purgatory:

- Pray at a cemetery
  It doesn't matter which cemetery, as long as you pray at one. Some suggested prayers are the Prayer of St. Gertrude or the Eternal Rest prayer.
- Visit a Church on All Souls' Day (Nov. 2)
  On the Solemnity of All Saints, on the Sunday before, or on the Sunday following, devoutly visit a church and recite an Our Father and the Creed."
- Go to Confession
  In order for one to obtain a plenary indulgence, for the poor souls or for oneself, the person must be detached from all sin. If not detached, a partial indulgence will be applied.
- Receive Holy Communion
  Simple as that! (Just please do it in the state of grace!)
- Pray for the Pope
  The Church suggests praying one "Our Father" and one
  "Hail Mary" for the Holy Father.



# **How to Support Your Priests**

Parishioners can encourage the priesthood by praying daily for vocations and for priests, by encouraging men they know to consider the priesthood, and by actively supporting the church's vocation ministry. Encouraging a priestly vocation includes recognizing spiritual commitment, such as regular participation in prayer and spiritual events, and speaking to potential candidates to offer support and invite them to explore the possibility of a vocation. A supportive community that fosters openness to God's call is crucial for men and women to discern and respond to a vocation to the priesthood or religious life.

# The Four Dimensions of Priestly Formation

When a man enters seminary to discern the priesthood, he begins a journey of conversion and formation that touches every part of his life. The Church, through the Program for Priestly Formation (PPF), outlines four key dimensions—sometimes called "pillars"—that shape this journey.

The first is human formation, the foundation of it all. A priest must be a man of integrity, balanced and virtuous, capable of relating well to others. Next comes spiritual formation, which roots him in friendship

with Christ through daily prayer, the Eucharist, and a life centered on holiness. Intellectual formation, the rigorous studies in philosophy and theology, prepare the man to explain the faith clearly and faithfully. Finally, pastoral formation prepares them to be shepherds—through hospital visits, parish ministry, encounters with the poor, and hands-on experiences of serving God's people.

These dimensions aren't separate boxes to be checked. They are woven together so that the seminarian is gradually shaped into a man configured to Christ

with human effort. In the end, priestly formation aims at this: a man so conformed to Christ that he can lay down his life for the flock.

# **ABOUT FATHER BORELLO**

of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana where he studied chemistry and chemical engineering.

While there, he received a call to the seminary to discern the priesthood.


He received his Bachelors in Theology and Masters of Divinity from Mundelein Seminary and was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Joliet in 2011.

He first served as an associate pastor at Notre Dame Parish in Clarendon Hills and was then transferred to Saints Peter and Paul Parish in Naperville in June of 2014.

In August of 2015, he began

serving at St. John Vianney College Seminary as a spiritual director, director of human formation, and instructor to over 120 men discerning a priestly vocation.

He returned to the Diocese of Joliet in August 2018 to begin as the Director of Vocations.







# St. Joseph's Corner

Whoever exalts himself shall be humbled. and whoever humbles himself shall be exalted. In saying this, therefore, it shows us that every exaltation is a kind of pride... —Rule of St. Benedict 7:1–2, (quoting Luke 18:14)

We live in a world where the path to righteousness is simple to trace but difficult to walk. With access

to vast libraries of theology, philosophy, and history—and now the ability to distill them through tools like artificial intelligence into compressed nuggets of virtue—the path could hardly be more visible. Yet, this convenience comes with the ever-growing distractions. Not only those that pull us outright from God, but also those that masquerade as holy: pursuits of insight, achievement, or moral superiority that secretly serve our pride and feed our egos.

In the temple, Jesus presents two men who pray: one absorbed in self, the other abandoned to mercy. One contemplates the gaze of God as that of a merciful and loving Father; the other projects his own judgments onto God, seeing through the distorted lens of his pride what he imagines to be divine approval.

When we encounter this parable, we can almost hear the echo of St. Augustine's reply: "Humility, humility, and humility." Pride, however, rarely announces itself; it prefers the quiet mask of righteousness and the comfortable illusion of being right.

## The Sin of Comparison

"I thank you, God, that I am not like other men..."

The Pharisee's prayer begins, not with thanksgiving, but with comparison. He measures holiness by distance from others rather than nearness to God, distorting the very image in which we were created—an image of communion in the Body of Christ. Rather than acknowledging his shared poverty before mercy, he exalts himself to judge.

Comparison is pride's first disguise; presumption is its second.

# The Sin of Presumption

Presumption is pride dressed in piety: a belief that we stand justified before God simply because we keep the rules. In doing so, we deny both the Father's covenantal fidelity, which we could never merit, and the Son's redeeming love, which fulfills what we never could. The Pharisee presumes relationship without repentance. He does not seek to receive and reflect Christ's love, but to stand above his need for mercy.

The Catechism names presumption as a failure of the first commandment (CCC 2094), for it places trust not in God's mercy but in one's own virtue. Presumption keeps us from seeking mercy because it convinces us we don't need it.

# Righteousness for Its Own Sake

Time and time again, we hear the Gospel truth: that no human effort can merit salvation, for we are saved by grace through faith. Yet just as often, the old temptation to Pelagianism resurfaces-the desire to be righteous for the sake of being right.

Once the heart grows content in its own observance, faith begins to wither. What was meant to be a living relationship with

God becomes a ledger of spiritual achievements impressive perhaps to men, but lifeless before heaven. The Pharisee's prayer reveals this danger: where faith becomes mere correctness, obedience without love, devotion without dependence, belief without charity. Such faith, as St. James reminds us, is dead—for love alone gives it breath.

Reliance on One's Own Righteousness "I fast... I tithe..."

The Pharisee stands secure in his moral record. He believes he has done what is required to be right, and therefore, he cannot be wrong. At the point that one's mind is convinced that they have merited God's favor through their human effort, they transfer their own will onto God's, often claiming divine revelation that reiterates back nothing more than the sound of their own certainty. What was meant to be dialogue becomes monologue; what began as worship ends in self-adoration. The voice of God is no longer sought; only the echo of human will remains.

Only the truly righteous man remains teachable. Self-righteousness closes the heart to conversion. But this path is the most dangerous. It creates a self-imposed distance from God's grace. And when God's will triumphs over their own, they find themselves in a spiritual desolation of their own making.

St. Augustine reminds us that "There is no greater proof of pride than when one cannot bear correction," (Sermon 82). The man who cannot be corrected cannot be converted.

In the end, the Pharisee's tragedy is not that he prayed wrongly, but that he never truly prayed at all. His words were aimed heavenward but remained imprisoned in the echo chamber of self. The tax collector, by contrast, spoke few words—but they rose like incense because they came from truth. His prayer was not performance but surrender, not self-defense but self-offering.

The saints remind us that the path to holiness does not ascend by way of achievement but descends by way of love. St. Bernadette once wrote, "I must die to myself continually and accept trials without complaining. I work, I suffer and I love with no other witness than His Heart." That is the quiet glory of humility: to live and labor unseen, confident that God's gaze alone is enough.

St. Joseph lived this hidden sanctity to perfection. He speaks no words in Scripture, yet his life is a continuous "yes" to Godobedience without self-assertion, righteousness without comparison, faith without presumption. In him, we see what true strength looks like: the courage to be small before God and steadfast in love when no one is watching.

So too must we, dear brothers, return to the temple of the heart—where comparison, presumption, and self-reliance give way to mercy. To pray not as those who are right, but as those who long to be made righteous. To die daily to the illusion of control and to live in the freedom of those who know they are

### SACRAMENTAL INFORMATION



**Baptism:** Baptisms are scheduled on the second Sunday of each month. Polish Baptisms are at 1:00 p.m., and English Baptisms are at 1:30 p.m. Please contact the Faith Formation Office before booking your venue for the celebration. Parents must be registered with our parish. Both sponsors must be over 16 years old, with at least one being a practicing Catholic.



**Marriage**: The bride and groom should be active members of our parish. The couple should contact the Faith Formation Office at least six months in advance to schedule their marriage, allowing for adequate preparation. Schedule the church date for your marriage before securing your venue.



**Funerals:** The family of the deceased will coordinate with the chosen funeral home to make the arrangements. The funeral home will then contact the Faith Formation Office at Our Mother of Good Counsel (OMGC) to notify us about the upcoming funeral Mass. We (OMGC) will get in touch with the family and work together to organize the funeral liturgy.



**Eucharist for the Homebound and Hospitalized:** If you are unable to attend Mass please contact the Parish Office for the Sacraments of the Eucharist. Our Homebound ministry would be happy to assist you.
