



## SAINTS AND COMMEMORATIONS



**Saint Scholastica (February 10)** The twin sister of St. Benedict, Scholastica founded the first Benedictine convent for women. She is remembered for her powerful prayer during a meeting with her brother, in which her love and faith had God send a storm so they could spend one last night talking about God.



**Our Lady of Lourdes (February 11)** This feast commemorates the 1858 apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Saint Bernadette in a grotto in France. Today, Lourdes remains a world-renowned site of pilgrimage and miraculous healing, and the day is observed as the World Day of Prayer for the Sick.



**Saint Agatha (February 5 - Memorialized this week)** A noble virgin and martyr from Sicily, Saint Agatha remained steadfast in her faith and her vow of purity despite brutal torture and imprisonment. She is honored as the patron saint of nurses and those suffering from breast cancer, serving as a powerful witness to courage and divine protection.



**Saint Valentine (February 14)** Beyond the modern holiday, Saint Valentine was a third-century Roman priest who was martyred for ministering to Christians and secretly performing marriages. He is the patron saint of engaged couples and happy marriages, reminding us that true love is rooted in sacrifice and faith.



**Saints Cyril and Methodius (February 14)** These two brothers, known as the "Apostles to the Slavs," were tireless missionaries who translated the Scriptures and Liturgy into the Slavonic language. They bridged Eastern and Western cultures and are honored today as co-patrons of Europe.

#### **What We Can Do For Lent**

The Season of Lent begins in a week and a half. As Catholic Christians, we prepare ourselves during Lent by fasting, praying and giving alms...ie giving of ourselves to others. **Jesus came to serve, not to be served.**

Incorporating prayer into our daily life is easier than you may think. There are many ways in which to do so. Bring prayer into your Domestic Church, aka your home by saying grace before meals. Say a bedtime prayer together before everyone goes to sleep. Praying together will soon become part of your daily routine.

There are several prayer apps that will help with your prayer life. One I especially like, and use myself is Hallow. There will be a free trial for Lent. There is a cost to continue when the free trial ends, but if you give up something for Lent, use the money you save and put the money toward a subscription to Hallow. This Lent the theme is **Lent Pray 40: The Return**. The Gospel of The Prodigal Son will be discussed. Repentance, mercy and restoration of relationship with God is the focus. God runs toward us always, He does not wait for us to be perfect to love us. Letting go of what keeps us distant from God will be another aspect discussed.

Week one will talk about distance awakening, how far we've wandered away from God due to sin, restlessness and distraction.

There is a children's version of Lent called Kid's Lent: Saints Alive.

We always have our phones with us....let's use this tool for prayer. Let's journey through Lent together, making ourselves a better version of "us" by becoming more prayerful people.



## St. Joseph's Corner

*"The light shines, but the weak eye is pained; yet it is healed by the very light that wounds it."*  
—Paraphrased from Augustine of Hippo, *Confessions*

This week's Gospel invites us to rediscover one of the most familiar teachings from one of Christ's best-known sermons. Familiarity, however, can dull perception. Trying to hear these words anew can feel like attempting to rediscover the back of one's own hand—always present, rarely examined. And yet, Christ's words demand exactly that.

The words "You are the light of the world" are usually received as a kind of encouragement—sometimes even as a compliment. We hear them as an affirmation of visibility, initiative, or influence. Light, in this reading, means being seen: standing out, making a difference, leaving a mark. The unspoken assumption is that the light Christ speaks of is something we must generate on our own or project by our own design.

Read this way, the passage becomes motivational. It reassures us that our faith should be noticeable and effective, perhaps even impressive. And while none of this is false, it is incomplete. The danger is subtle: the focus shifts from what illuminates to who is noticed. The light becomes ours before it remains His.

Jesus tells us that we are the light of the world. He does not say that we will become the light, nor does He issue a command to manufacture it. This is not first an invitation or a mission; it is a declaration—one that reveals what is already true because of Him.

Christ alone is Light by nature. Yet those who are united to Him are illuminated by participation. We are made capable of light because we are created in His image and, by grace, infused with His life. Because that life is given for others, burning does not make the lamp light; it reveals what has already been received.

The lamp, then, must burn. The wick is consumed so that light may be given. To be a lamp is to accept a certain cost—to suffer, at times, for the sake of others and for the Kingdom. Yet this suffering is not self-justifying, nor does it confer importance. As John Chrysostom reminds us, the lamp does not draw attention to itself for burning; it simply gives light. Its humility lies not in the pain it endures, but in its refusal to claim the light as its own.

The lamp burns because it participates in the reign of Christ the King—not in spectacle but in truth, not in self-display but in obedience. And because His kingship is ordered toward restoration, not loss, nothing given in fidelity to Him is ever wasted. Pope Pius XI articulated this truth when he reflected on the nature of Christ's kingship:

*"The empire of our Redeemer embraces all men...His kingdom is spiritual and is concerned with spiritual things."*  
—Quas Primas.

On February 11, 1858, a young miller's daughter in the south of France encountered a light deep within a grotto. It was not a light she possessed, but one she received—and in receiving it, she would burn quietly in fidelity, shining for the world for more than a century and a half. Her name was Bernadette Soubirous, better

known today as St. Bernadette of Lourdes.

Bernadette herself did not seek to be seen. She resisted attention and repeatedly attempted to retreat into obscurity. But the basket placed over the lamp did not come from her alone. It was lowered by parents who feared scandal, by civil authorities who suspected fraud, by clergy who demanded proof, and by a public eager either to dismiss or to exploit what it could not control. The light was questioned, examined, confined, and pressured into silence—not once, but persistently. Yet the Gospel does not promise that the light will go unchallenged; it promises only that it will not be overcome. What Bernadette received could be doubted, resisted, even suppressed for a time—but it could not be extinguished.

The basket was temporary. And because His reign is assured, it ultimately did not prevent Bernadette's light from shining more clearly—illuminating the world with a witness to truth that, in turn, reveals other lights long obscured beneath the baskets of doubt.

Yet her light shone most brightly before it could even be seen—measured not by recognition, but by fidelity. She was subjected to repeated questioning by civil authorities who suspected deception. She was pressured by local officials to recant or remain silent. She was doubted by clergy who, bound rightly to discernment, nonetheless subjected her to scrutiny. She was mocked by neighbors, followed by crowds, and spoken about far more than she was ever listened to. This weighed heavily on a frail body and a simple mind, and even after the apparitions ceased, the cost did not. Illness, isolation, and obscurity marked her remaining years. The basket remained, pressing down—not briefly, but persistently.

In Bernadette's lifetime, the Church ultimately affirmed the truth of what she had received, but she herself was never placed at the center. The light was recognized; the lamp was allowed to fade into silence. This is how the Kingdom advances—not by avoiding resistance, but by outlasting it. Bernadette understood this well when she famously said, "I was asked to tell, not to convince."

If this Gospel unsettles us, it is because it asks more than visibility. It asks for fidelity. Most of us will never be placed on a lampstand in the world's eyes. Our witness will be tested quietly—misunderstood, doubted, or set aside beneath baskets not of our choosing. Yet the Kingdom does not advance by force of recognition, but by endurance in truth. What is received from Christ and guarded in obedience will shine when and where He wills. The question is not whether the light will be seen, but whether it will be faithful while it waits.

Bernadette's life reminds us that we are not responsible for outcomes, only for faithfulness. We are asked to tell, not to convince; to remain, not to prevail. The light entrusted to us is not diminished by resistance—it is clarified by it.

In that spirit, the story of Bernadette is being brought to the stage in Bernadette de Lourdes: The Musical, opening in Chicago this month. More information can be found at: <https://www.bernadettethemusical.com/>

May we have the courage to let the light we have received do its work—whether seen or hidden—trusting that no fidelity offered to Christ the King is ever lost.

## SACRAMENTAL INFORMATION



**Baptism:** Baptisms are scheduled on the second Sunday of each month. Polish Baptisms are at 1:00 p.m., and English Baptisms are at 1:30 p.m. Please contact the Faith Formation Office before booking a venue for the celebration. Parents must be registered with our parish. Both sponsors must be over 16 years old, with at least one being a practicing Catholic.



**Marriage:** The bride and groom should be active members of our parish. The couple should contact the Faith Formation Office at least six months in advance to schedule their marriage, allowing for adequate preparation. Schedule the church date for your marriage before securing your venue.



**Funerals:** The family of the deceased will coordinate with the chosen funeral home to make the arrangements. The funeral home will then contact the Faith Formation Office at Our Mother of Good Counsel (OMGC) to notify us about the upcoming funeral Mass. We (OMGC) will get in touch with the family and work together to organize the funeral liturgy.
